INTRODUCTION

As Puerto Rico's \$72B public debt has brought the island's service infrastructure to the breaking point, millions of Puerto Ricans are suffering. Hundreds of thousands have migrated to the US mainland in the past few years. Meanwhile, investors who have profited off of Puerto Rico's debt are pushing Congress to adopt solutions that prioritize their own profits over families' basic needs and the economic future of Puerto Rico.

Positive change for Puerto Rico – addressing the most urgent aspects of the crisis but also going beyond -- requires a broad grassroots effort on the island and in the diaspora to develop and push for solutions. The issues will not be resolved only in the halls of government but require participation from all those who care about the 3.5 million Americans who call Puerto Rico home.

VAMOS4PR is a group of labor, community, cultural and human rights organizations and individuals who live and work in the US mainland.

We agree that the current situation in Puerto Rico requires drastic and immediate changes that focus on improving the living conditions of the 3.5 million Puerto Ricans living on the island, and developing Puerto Rico's economy with policies that support working families.

We recognize that the current situation has been caused by decades of island and federal governmental policies that fostered extreme inequality and have resulted in a population that has more than double the unemployment rate found in the US mainland and keeps almost 40% of island residents living under the poverty line.

We believe that the only way to an equitable and just situation for all Puerto Ricans is to develop and promote policies that both hold accountable those who set off the crisis and support the well-bring of working people on the island.

The VAMOS4PR network seeks to:

WIN DEBT RESTRUCTURING by securing a moratorium on debt payments, a thorough and complete audit of the debt and using other mechanisms that will not place an undue burden on Puerto Rican families;

PROPOSE AN ECONOMY FAIR TO WORKERS IN PUERTO RICO by protecting and expanding workers' rights, including the right to organize in unions; raise the minimum wage as we are seeking to do in New York and other localities to create good jobs; and protect public services and reject austerity as the solution;

ADVANCE LONG-TERM DEVELOPMENT SOLUTIONS that will sustain the Puerto Rican economy, in areas such as renewable energy, tourism and agriculture, rejecting the notion that the only long-term economic solution is to keep the island a low-wage labor source for multinational corporations;

EDUCATE AND MOBILIZE THE PUERTO RICAN DIASPORA AND ITS ALLIES. and make Puerto Rico again an issue of concern and priority for progressives.
